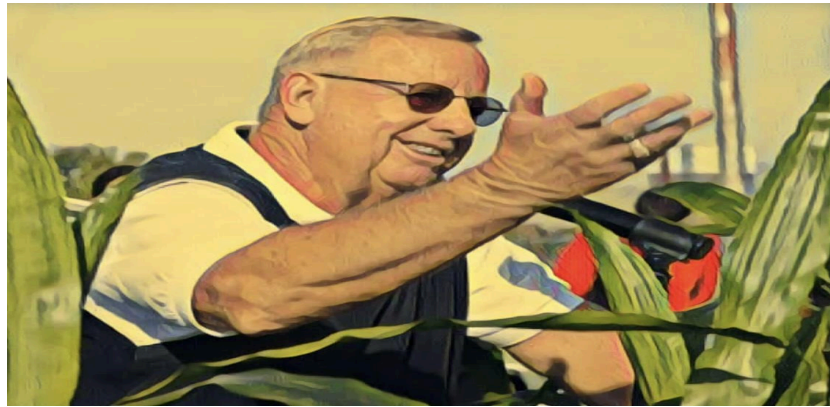

"The adage is that bad news comes in pairs. Well, over the past month, that news unfortunately doubled when we lost four exceptional human beings who helped shape the sports landscape in El Paso. I crossed paths with many of them when their children played in El Paso Parks and Recreation sports leagues and through the wider sports community. Even though they were parts of great teams in their careers, perhaps the greatest teams they built were their families.

Richard Culler, longtime athletic trainer and health instructor at Bel Air High School, was always there for student athletes in his 31 years at the Lower Valley school. Its athletic field house was named in his honor several years ago, and he didn't mind the lengthy workdays because he loved healing the injuries and sometimes bruised egos of his athletes. Culler helped the Parks and Recreation Department in the early days of the summer track and field program. He was a role model who cared about both male and female sports -- but most of all he cared about his beloved Bel Air. Culler died in February at age 63.

"Coach Culler epitomizes what Big Red Pride represents," Bel Air basketball coach Rob Dibler said. "He will always be remembered by the thousands of lives he touched as a teacher through athletics at Bel Air High School. He was a dear friend and mentor to me, and I will do my best to continue his legacy and make him proud."

Coach Culler has witnessed awkward fads, ridiculous haircuts, and lets not forget a different administration and teaching staff throughout his many years at Bel Air.

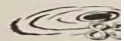

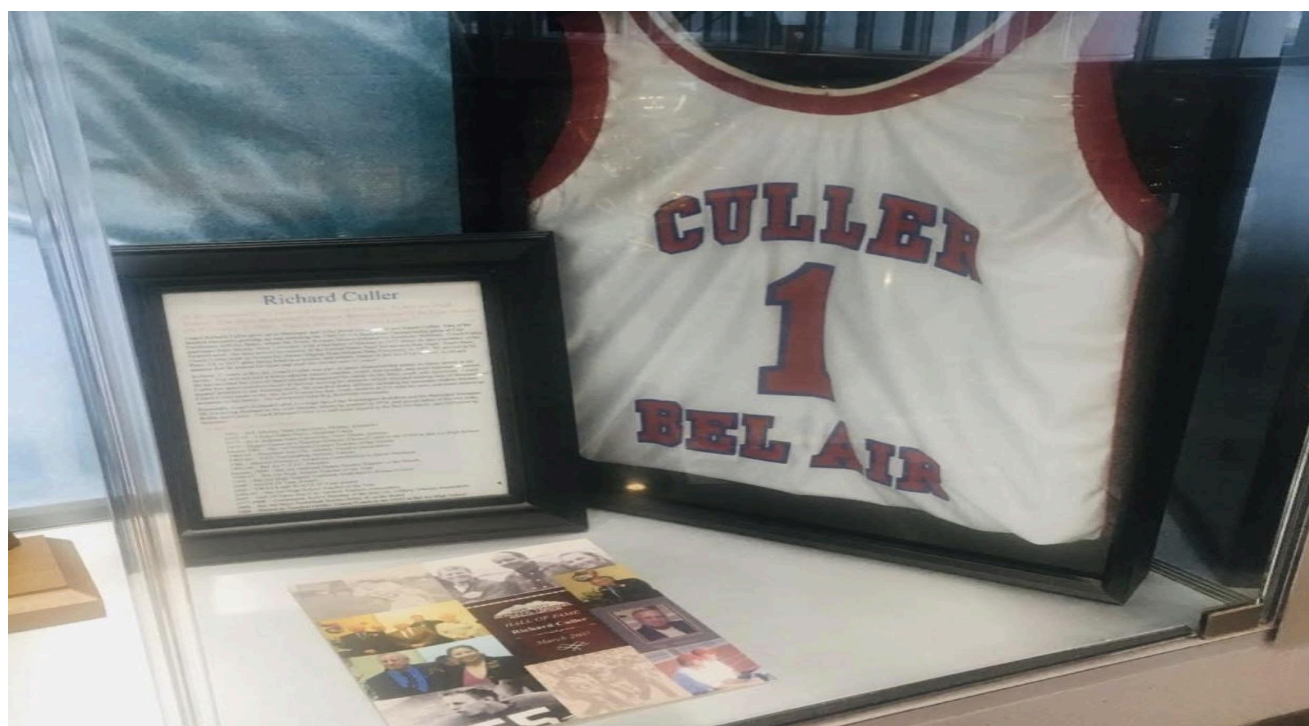
Bel Air's No. 1

Bel Air trainer gets retirement sendoff

A revered Bel Air High School athletic trainer and teacher will be honored at a celebration this week that recognizes his more than three decades of service at the school.

Richard Culler, an athletic trainer and health teacher, is retiring after working for 31 years at the high school — an accomplishment that prompted students and teachers to organize a party Saturday on his behalf.

Culler, 58, said last week that he hopes former students and friends turn out to the celebration. He plans to spend his retirement working around the house, traveling some and playing golf.

"Obviously, I've had a lot of great athletes over the years," he said. "I just really enjoy taking care of the kids and being a caretaker, mentally and physically."

A colleague of Culler's described him as a devoted teacher who's always had a great moral character and a desire to be a positive influence on student athletes.

Culler models the lesson that education is important for the students at Bel Air. He earned a bachelor of sci-

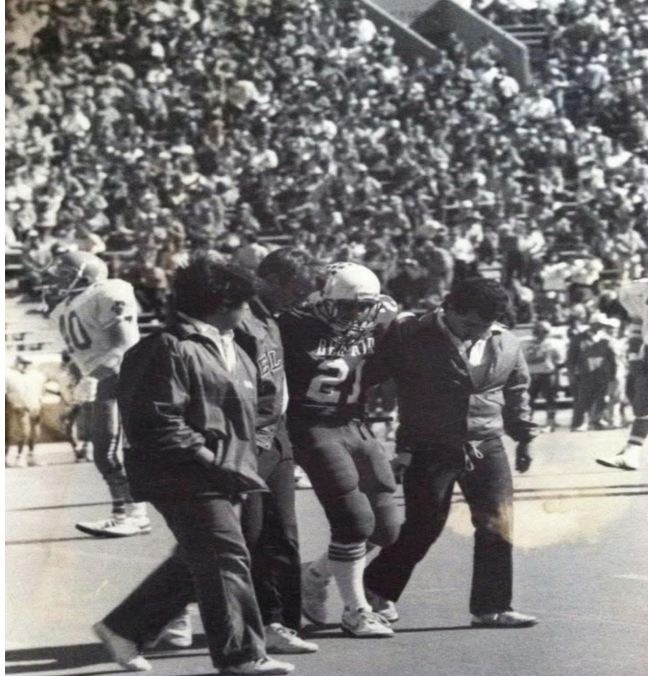
ence degree from Murray State University in Murray, Ky., and a master's in science from Indiana State University in Terre Haute, Ind.

"He's always instilled a positive work ethic in all the athletes, and he really pushes them," said Nancy Vanley, an athletic trainer at Bel Air.

Bel Air High School students and teachers are having a farewell gathering in his honor from 1 to 3 p.m. in the parking lot of the Bel Air Field House, 731 Yarbrough. School officials are awaiting a Board of Trustees ruling on whether to name the field house in Culler's honor.

Last year, Culler was inducted into the San City Athletic Trainers Association Hall of Fame.
