Webb Excels In Fourth Season With LMU Senior Marlee Webb Shooting Her Way to the Record Books With the Lions

Most people, if faced with being on the verge of becoming LMU women's basketball's all-time assist leader, might be ecstatic or boastful. Not Marlee Webb. About to break the record of 429 career assists, Webb responds modestly to questions about the record with a shy smile. "It's kind of cool," she remarks.

Webb also is among career leaders in games played, scoring average, points, steals, free throws, and three-point field goals. Her other accomplishments include being a two-time West Coast Conference (WCC) scholar-athlete and assist leader, being named the WCC Player of the Month for December, and being named the WCC Player of the Year for the same month. But it's her accomplishments on the court that Webb loves. "I just love playing basketball. It's a big part of my life," she explains.

To understand Webb's success at LMU, one must first understand her background. Marlee Joy Webb was born on December 24, 1973 to Brian and Lisa Webb. Webb's father is still employed, while her mother is a teacher. She also has a sister, Natalie, who is a senior in high school.

Growing up her entire life in El Paso, Texas, Webb began playing basketball in the fifth grade. She vividly remembers playing basketball without game at the University of Texas at El Paso (UTEP) which inspired her to pursue the sport. Webb's inspiration, Webb began to play basketball. As she de-

scribed it, "I love the game ever since for me it's just a game playing."

Webb attended Hanks High School in El Paso, Texas, where she was a three-time MVP honors her junior and senior seasons. Playing mostly shooting guard in high school, Webb helped lead her team to a 25-3 record and the second round of the state championship playoffs.

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Webb completed that "we had good teams and a good program. It was a good experience; I learned a lot."

Webb had success in high school. Webb was heavily recruited by other colleges and universities. She narrowed her choices to UTEP, the University of Texas at San Antonio, and LMU. Although her decision was a tough one, Webb explains that she chose LMU because it provided a good opportunity for play-

ing basketball and because of the education she would receive. Webb was excited to attend college in Los Angeles, even though she admits that she was a bit shocked by L.A., claiming that it is "a totally different world compared to Texas."

Not knowing anyone at LMU before coming here, Webb found her team as her new family. Webb credits her teammates' support and camaraderie for her relatively easy transition to college life. Helping to make an impact immediately on the team, Webb was thrust into the starting line up due to an injury sustained by her teammate Miki Houdard. This experience, Webb believes, helped her in developing her leadership role and her feel for the game.

Webb has started the majority of her games since her first season. She has alternated between point and shooting guard throughout her career at LMU. In describing the positions, Webb says that "they are two different worlds. Playing point, I have to get the ball to others; playing shooting guard, I have to score." Asked if she preferred one over the other, Webb replied that they are too different to rate; she likes them both.

Being a co-captain this year, Webb has found herself one of the leaders of a very young team. In speaking about her leadership role, Webb explained that as a senior she knew that she would have to take charge, along with co-captain Luana Ishikawa. On and off the court, part of being a leader on the team, Webb says, is being there for the younger players off the court, as well as leading the team on the court.

Team mate Miki Grahobski echoed this sentiment about Webb:

"We [the younger players] can always rely on Marlee; she's always there for us. On the court, Marlee is a top leader, and we put our faith and trust in her; we believe in her."

A tremendous competitor who never lets up, Webb had difficulty trying to get her teammates to play better. However, she expresses much enthusiasm about this year's team and its accomplishments. Webb points to new head coach Julie Witte for the change in the team. "Coach Witte has been great. She's a great motivator who keeps us believing in ourselves and what we can do."

Witte asked about her fondest memory in her basketball career, Webb points to this year's victory over Santa Clara that broke a twenty-nine game road conference losing streak. In the game, Webb scored the game-winning shot after her team trailed by a fifteen-point deficit in the game.

With graduation less than three months away, Webb has begun looking to the future. A Psychology major and History minor, Webb intends to seek a graduate fellowship in coaching at a college or university. Her ultimate goal is to someday be a head coach. Webb would like to stay in L.A. after she graduates, but eventually, she says, she would like to return to Texas.

Thinking about the future also makes Webb somewhat nervous. "I'm really going to miss basketball, and I'm going to miss LMU; too, the people, my friends, my teammates, and the weather."

Asked about her philosophy in the WCC, Webb says, "You just give up on anything you do. If you keep working hard, good things will come to you."

It's better to invest in her approach to both basketball and life, and all is doubt serve her well in her future.

Webb, a native of El Paso, Texas, recently completed a distinguished four-year career with the

women's basketball team. A four-year starter and three-time team captain, she holds several LMU school records, including most assists (429) and most steals (102). She also ranks among school leaders in steals, three-point field goals, points, and games played. She earned WCC Player of the Month honors in December and she was an all-WCC honorable mention choice in 1996. A psychology major, she volunteers as a counselor for children and also participated in the LMU Leadership Conference.

Tonight, the top-ranked Huskies (25-4, 13-0 in District 1-4A) look to finish off district competition in perfect fashion

against No. 8-ranked Burges (22-7, 12-1).

"We're doing good and we've been committed to playing hard," Huskies coach Marlee Webb said. "We've developed good chemistry as the season has gone on and we've developed a strong bench."

The Huskies are led by forwards Chloe Pridgen and Jada Ellis, who have been consistent all year.

Meanwhile, Burges has been

Prime Prep (23-0), ranked No. 5 in the nation by ESPN and No. 9 by USA Today, has defeated good teams from Texas, California, Arizona, Nevada and Ohio. Prime Prep is led by forward Jordan Mickey, who has signed with

Louisiana State, and Karviar Shepherd, who has signed with TCU.

"It's going to be a great challenge for us," Lions coach Ana Carroll said. "We are excited about the game and the chance to play against a good team."

The city's No. 2-ranked Scorpions got 23 points from Janelle Perez and 16 points from Leslie Caballero to lead them past the state's No. 12 team in Odessa.

Horizon overcame a four-point deficit at halftime and a 10-point deficit in the second half to improve to 30-2 on the season.

We practice those situations in practice and I've hit a shot like that before, but never in a game."

Chapin is now 32-0 and will play Canyon next Tuesday in Odessa. Plainview finishes 24-8.

First it was five points, then a couple glances at the scoreboard later, the margin ballooned to 26.

Riverside started its Class 3 bi-district game against Chapin on Tuesday fairly well, but the No. 3 Huskies broke even a 13-point contest in the second half and ran away with 9-41 home victory.

"I just think we stayed after because the first half we had a lot of fouls, those types of things, and I thought we exceeded a lot better in the second half, which is why the crowd jumped up a little bit," Chapin head coach Marlee Webb said.

The Rangers (22-9) fought harder than the score indicated but they withered and stumbled against an air-tight offense and one of the best interior games in El Paso.

"We had them in the first half, but they started pounding and pounding it," Rangers coach Kristi Lattin said. "I have to give them credit because they're a good team and they didn't let up."

The bi-district win sent

Chapin (24-6) to the area round, where it will play Plainview at 4:30 p.m. MST Friday at Odessa College.

"I think this gives us momentum and confidence going into the game against Plainview," Husky senior Chastity Noble said.

Noble played the way an all-city guard is supposed to, scoring a game-high 19 points to go along with eight rebounds, five assists and five steals.

Hannah Altheide complemented her by striking three times from behind the arc and finishing with 10 points.

Meanwhile, teammate Evelyn Britton dominated the paint with 12 points, 12 rebounds and three blocks, while fellow post players Natasha Blackmore and Jalena Sanders combined for 13 rebounds and seven steals.

"Tasha was huge," Webb said. "I thought she did a good job coming off the bench. She

really gave good energy, leadership and rebounded really well. And, you know, Chastity's herself. She really came through in the second half.

"Evelyn and Jalena have done a good job all year inside, and Charlotte Johnson started the game for us and brought energy."

Chapin definitely wasn't short on intensity Tuesday, but was challenged early as Riverside stayed within five points after the first quarter and was down only 13 despite scoring all 10 of its second-quarter points at the foul line.

Yet once Noble took over in the third quarter, the Rangers faltered quickly and failed to recover. A 7-0 run spearheaded by the senior gave Chapin a 20-point lead, then the Huskies quickly padded it in the final eight minutes by working the low post.

Gena Morales, who made her presence felt in the fourth quarter, led Riverside with 10 points. Christina Avila contributed 10 rebounds and two steals, while Ryann Fierro and Jaelyn Stallworth teamed up for 11 rebounds.

Franklin girls basketball coach Marlee Webb won her 400th career game on Friday night when her Cougars beat rival Coronado, 50-29.

The Cougars were led by Katia Gallegos with 27 points and were in control for most of the game. The Cougars led 22-10 at halftime and 33-21 after three quarters.

"I'm really appreciative of the people who have helped me in this journey and who have helped me achieve success," Webb said.

Franklin is ranked No. 1 in the city and is 12-1 in District 1-6A, which leads the district.

Webb is in her fifth season at the helm of the Cougars and the Cougars have lost just one district game in the past three seasons.

"This year's team has worked really hard and has continued to improve each day," Webb said. "I'm really proud of what this team has accomplished."

Also in girls basketball: Burgos edged Chapin, 60-57 in a District 1-5A battle. Both teams are 11-2 in district and are tied for second.

Burgos has beaten the Huskies twice this year. Melinda Vargas led the Mustangs with 18 points, Jessica Amezcua scored 16 and Bianca Gonzalez scored 13. Yanetse Dominguez led Chapin with 26 points.

In boys action: Bel Air continues its late season surge and is now in place to make the playoffs out of District 2-5A after a 56-36 win vs. Horizon.

The Highlanders are in sole possession of fourth place with an 8-5 record in district.

Jailon Gentry led Bel Air with 11 points, Dominic Bevarano scored 11 points and Henry Melendez scored 10.

In an always intense rivalry game, Coronado knocked off Franklin, 53-43. Rio Mitchell, Beck Brown and Ayson Sobalbach scored 11 points for the Thunderbirds.

Franklin girls make regional quarters

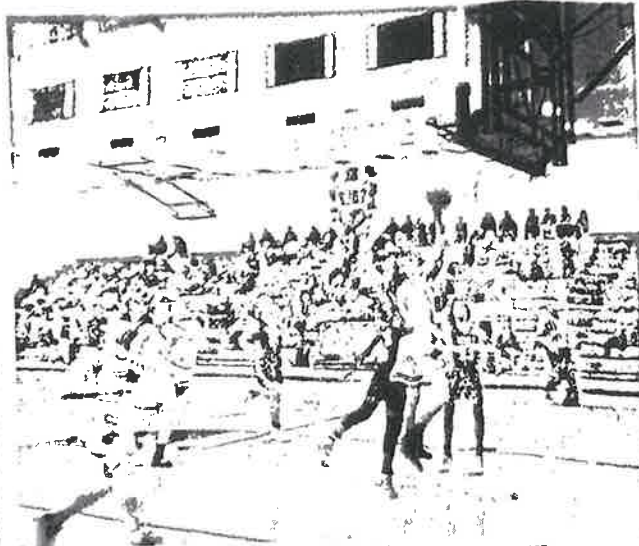
The Franklin Cougars are the last girls basketball team from El Paso remaining in the state playoffs and with two overtime wins, the team is feeling pretty good about their chances of keeping this season alive.

The Cougars will face off with Amarillo Tascosa on Tuesday at Andrews in the Class 6A regional quarterfinals, with a berth in the Region 1-6A tournament on the line.

Franklin upended Midland, 52-47, in overtime in the bi-district round, then went on the road to beat Arlington Bowie, 40-36, in the area round in Midland.

Even before that, the Cougars overcame a 1-2 start in District 1-6A play to finish 8-2 and claim a share of the title. And star point guard Katia Gallegos, who has signed with UTEP, battled an ankle injury and a concussion during the season that forced her to miss a handful of games.

"We've overcome some challenges this year and we've stayed together as a team," Gallegos said. "We came back after a slow start in district and did well. We've won two tight games in the playoffs and that says so much about our

team."

In fact in the win vs. Arlington Bowie, Gallegos fouled out in regulation but the team stepped up with clutch play from

its defense and from Kara Marcantel, who scored 18 points, and Clarissa Dominguez, who hit two big free throws in the overtime period.

"When I fouled out, Kara came to me and said we have your back and that was just a great thing to see," Gallegos said. "She stepped up big, our whole team just stepped up in overtime. We don't want this season to end. We know it will be a tough game against Amarillo Tascosa and we'll have to be ready for another close one."

Marcantel has been steady for the Cougars all season, averaging 10.3 points and 6.8 rebounds.

She is second on the team in scoring behind Gallegos, who averages 20.7 points per game.

"This year my confidence is much higher and I've been more consistent this season," she said. "I learned a great deal from last year that helped me and it's been a good season overall. We've had some ups and downs and a few challenges. But we have worked hard, we have stayed together as a team and we've improved as a team. We had to really fight and stay together in district and now we've won two close playoff games. Our experience helps. We've had some close games this year and that has helped us grow."

If Franklin wins Tuesday, it will meet either South Grand Prairie or Cedar Hill on Friday in Fort Worth.

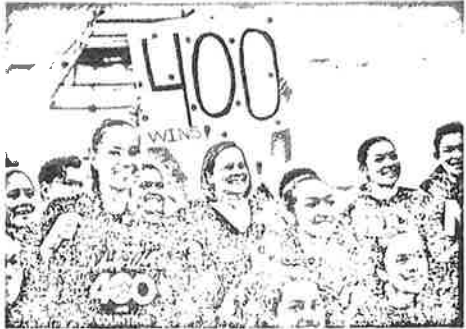
Vandegrift hires El Paso's Webb for girls basketball

After its most successful season in school history, the Vandegrift girls' basketball program will enter the 2020-21 school year with a new head coach.

Marlee Webb, a fixture in El Paso's basketball scene for a generation, will take over the Vipers after amassing more than 400 wins in her hometown. A former standout at El Paso Hanks who went on to star at Loyola Marymount in the 1990s, Webb has more than 400 career coaching wins at Clint, El Paso Chapin and El Paso Franklin. She compiled a 160-58 record with four district titles over the past seven seasons while turning Franklin into a Class 6A playoff powerhouse in rugged Region I. Webb is also active in the Texas Girls Coaches Association.

Webb transitions to Vandegrift just as the Vipers move into a revamped District 25-6A this fall. The Vipers will compete with the five Round Rock school district programs — Round Rock, Westwood, Cedar Ridge, Stony Point and McNeil — as well as fellow Leander district school Vista Ridge.

Hutto moves up from Class 5A to complete the Williamson County-centric district, which moves from Region II into Region IV. Six of the eight teams in the new 25-6A qualified for the playoffs this past season, including Vandegrift.

Webb replaces Jonathan Jones, who returned to his native Brownwood with his family for a business opportunity. Jones had a 99-76 record in five seasons as the Vipers' head coach and led the team on a memorable playoff run this past season. Vandegrift had to win its final four regular-season games to even

have a shot at the postseason, then won a play-in game over McNeil to secure a spot.

After stunning state-ranked Houston Cypress-Ranch in the first round of the playoffs, the Vipers beat Klein Collins before falling to rival Vista Ridge in the regional quarterfinals.

The Vipers look well-equipped to build on the 2020 playoff run, which was the longest in school history. Incoming juniors Skye O'Rourke and Brooke Srnick will anchor a lineup that will welcome back as many as nine players from this past season's team.

The Vandegrift Lady Vipers are 14-6 overall and 3-0 in district prior to Tuesday's expected win over Vista Ridge.

"Skye O'Rourke is leading us in scoring at 15.8, with Sarah Sheriff 9.0, and Sophia Griego

adding 9 ppg as well. Sarah leads us in rebounding with 7.1 per game, followed by Skye's 6.1, and Sophia's 4.1. Getting great contributions from Sam Ely, Kyle Atkinson, and Ana Baker," said Marlee Webb, VHS girls basketball head coach.

Sophia Griego scored 20 points and Skye O'Rourke had 14 as Vandegrift defeated Vista Ridge 34-26 in a district 25-6A win with a three-way tie for first. The Vipers entered the top two seasons of the fourth and final district game with three games left.
Vandegrift trailed early, then Griego and O'Rourke broke open as the host Vipers outpaced Vista Ridge 22-13 in the fourth quarter for the victory. Bailey Acklesham added 11 points for Vandegrift. Alex Pinal and Sydney Bond and had 12 points each for Vista Ridge. Anaiah Barker added 11 points, and Klenna Weimery had 10.
McNeil faced a 14-10 15-22 and Cedar Ridge beat Stony Point 54-50 to force the three-way tie for first in 9-12. There's still much to play in 18 spots.
Oliver Saunpala scored 18 points and 10 rebounds, and Branka Oshiro finished with 10 points. Alyssa Beckman led Alto with 12 points.
